~AHCC Food Pantry Blog~

Running a Food Pantry is truly a mission, an outreach effort performed by many churches and civic groups. Ever wonder how other Food Pantries are doing. Is there still a need? These three "snapshots" from organizations may give you some answers.

The Northborough (MA) Food Pantry reported in July 2014, "In April of this year 108 families made use of the food pantry. This is an increase of 93% compared to April of 2007. We also distributed 395 bags of food in the month of April 2014. This is an increase of 72% compared to April of 2007."

The Grove City (PA) Community Food Pantry made information something for each family, serving 400+ people each month. "In each order of groceries, our clients receive a monthly newsletter, which provides our clients with information regarding the food pantry like upcoming "Food for Thought" programs, change in hours due to holidays, and contact information. We help our clients by providing information on federal programs like LIHEAP and WIC, and community resources like Angel Food Ministries and Christian Assistance N etwork."

The Bowie (MD) Interfaith Pantry operates with a simple concept, as a community-based social services program providing emergency food and financial to those who is experiencing need – without regard to race, creed or gender. In April 2016, they served 802 bags of groceries to 309 households, with an estimated value of food distributed of \$29, 770. So what do these organizations have in common with the AHCC Food Pantry?

We all provide HOPE to those in need of food for a variety of reasons. We follow the lead of the San Antonio Food Bank, achieving their mission of helping feed the hungry in the San Antonio area and throughout Southwest Texas. Is there a need for these services?

The 2015 Census indicates that in Texas that there are some 4.6 million Food Insecure People, for whom getting their next meal is an unknown. When we donate our time to the AHCC Food Pantry, we all become a partner in the fight against hunger.

Think of this, OUR gift of HOPE for others in our community. For AHCC, HOPE= Helping Other People Eat.



I want to thank everyone for the outpouring of love and compassion shown to both Ron and me during his long hospital stay, followed by his death. During wait for college to begin, I was drafted into the Army. I would serve ten years before leaving the Army. Then college for a B.S. in Medical Technology, then back into the Army for a total of 26 years. Happy to serve, so happy to be retired.

Met my wife, Jeanine, we married and have three wonderful daughters of whom we are very proud. My wife has been another great gift from God. Our life together has been a joy and a team effort to be there for each other as we serve Christ, our family and others. Our mutual love and respect has been our strength. Our church family must continue to develop this mindset also.

The Walk to Emmaus movement changed my Spiritual life greatly. Serving on Emmaus and Chrysalis teams led me to the KAIROS Prison Ministry more than twenty years ago and is ongoing as long as I can be of service to those incarcerated in Texas State prisons.

Let me back up a little. In 1995, on my first Kairos weekend at Huntsville prison, I accepted the call to the ministry. At 55 years of age, I went to Seminary, accepted my first pastorate at First Christian Church (DOC), Fredericksburg, Texas as a licensed minister. After three years, we went to San Antonio Christian Church to serve. Graduation finally arrived and after that my Ordainment. Seventeen years later, we "retired".

After serving as "Pulpit Supply" for many months, we now are blessed to be a part of this family and to serve as minister.

I have said too much and now hope to "Listen" to your life stories as we live and grow together.

The Dalai Lama once said, "When you talk you are only repeating what you know, When you listen you may learn something NEW".

Finding Your Place in Ministry

How often have we thought, *I'm the only one I trust to do this?* Or *It's just easier to do it myself?* We are uncomfortable giving up control and asking for help. We use the excuse that it's easier to do it, because we're certain that others won't do it correctly and we'll have to redo it later.

When we adopt this attitude, we fail to recognize the gifts and abilities of others. We deny that often there may be more than one correct way. In addition, probably most significantly, we do not recognize that doing it perfectly may be an unattainable goal, perhaps even an unnecessary one.

The grace of God provides that even imperfect people are not only welcome in the church but also required. Otherwise, the church building would be a very empty and lonely place.

Deacons are called to discern the gifts they have been given and to seek to help others discern their own gifts. Paul in 1 Corinthians 12 affirms that every person created by God has a God-given gift, and those gifts should be used to glorify God.

Deacons must learn to use their individual gifts as part of the whole. The entire body must work together in the same direction. Paul says that even the

weakest member of the body is indispensable. Indeed the body that does not support the smallest part will surely falter.

Being a deacon requires both commitment and discipline. Discipline is a spiritual muscle. The first few times you attempt something, it may be extremely difficult. As with any exercise, as the muscle becomes more accustomed to the workout, it becomes easier. The diaconate, as a body, needs the same kind of discipline.

Members of the diaconate should be active participants in both the church and the groups within the church. They should be a conduit for information to flow between all of those groups. In both our words and deeds, we should seek to witness to the word. Our very actions are a prayer when they are done to the glory of God.

As a gathering of believers, we welcome the Spirit into our midst. Unless the Spirit bonds us to one another, we are not united; and our accomplishments will fall short. When we are united, pray through our words and deeds, our needs will be satisfied.
